**SUBJECT:** 2000/01 County Priorities for General Child Development  
Funding

**RECOMMENDATION:**

Adopt a Resolution that approves the Priorities set by the Child Care Partnership Council of San Mateo County for the distribution of FY 2000/01 Department of Education funding for General Child Care and Development.

**Background on the Child Care Partnership Council:**

Local Child Care and Development Planning Councils were established by the state legislature in 1991 in every county in California. In San Mateo County, the Child Care Partnership Council is the local planning council. In 1997 with the advent of welfare reform, the role of child care planning councils was strengthened through AB 1542 and the implementation of CaLWORKS. (See *Education Code*, Sections 8499.3 *et. seq.* and 54744)

The purpose of the Child Care Partnership Council is to provide a forum for the identification of local priorities for child care and to develop policies to meet the needs identified within those priorities. The Child Care Partnership Council makes decisions concerning the local distribution of state child care funding. The Child Care Partnership Council is also mandated to conduct a community-wide needs assessment for child care and to develop a comprehensive county-wide plan for child care for all children.

The Council is co-chaired by Dr. Floyd Gonella, County Superintendent of Schools and a member of the County Board of Supervisors – to be announced. The 22 voting members of the Council include consumers of child care, child care providers, and public and community agency representatives. The County Superintendent of Schools and a member of the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors are responsible for the appointment of members. They also serve as co-chairs of the Council. The Child Care Partnership Council meets monthly, its meetings are open to the public.

Discussion:

Types of Care / Amount of Funding / Number of Children Served

Under its contract FY 00/01, the Child Care Partnership Council is required by the California Department of Education, Child Development Division to set county priorities for the distribution of 2000/01 fiscal year funding for subsidized child care. The funding is for full-day, full-year General Child Care and Development funding for children 0 – 5 years.

Tasks and Timeline

The priorities are based on identifying the most underserved areas in the community by comparing the ratio of publicly subsidized child care and development program services to the need for these services. The Child Care Partnership Council is also required to obtain public input on its recommended priorities. Approval of the County Board of Supervisors and the County Superintendent of Schools is required prior to the January 30, 2001 reporting of the county priorities to the Department of Education.

Needs Assessment and Analysis

Accordingly, the Council conducted a needs assessment which identified the number of income eligible children in each zip code area needing care and the number of subsidized child care and development services being provided to children by zip code. Numerous other indicators of need were documented. These other indicators include labor force participation rates; live and Medi-Cal eligible births; free and reduced school lunches; number of TANF recipients; and teenage births. All of these indicators were gathered by zip code. This data was analyzed by a designated committee of the Council and recommendations for priorities were made to the full Council for consideration.

Public Hearing Conducted

On December 18, 2000 the Child Care Partnership Council held a public hearing during its regularly scheduled meeting to seek input on the recommended priorities. The hearing was held at the San Mateo County Office of Education. Data and recommendations were reviewed, public input considered, and the vote to establish the final priorities was completed.

Priorities Approved by the Child Care Partnership Council and recommended to the County Board of Supervisors:

Based on the recommendations of the Committee designated to examine various indicators of need and supply, the Child Care Partnership Council voted unanimously on December 18, 2000 to approve the following zip code priorities for the Fiscal Year 2000/01 full-day General Child Care funding for San Mateo County.

**The following zip codes in San Mateo County are “unserved or underserved” in the ratio of publicly subsidized child care to the need for these services:**

**94002, 94010 (Burlingame, but not Hillsborough), 94014, 94015, 94018, 94019, 94020, 94021, 94037, 94038, 94303, 94025, 94044, 94030, 94060, 94061, 94062 (Redwood City – but not Woodside), 94063, 94066, 94070, 94074, 94080, 94401, 94402, 94403**

**These zip codes have been designated a priority for the following reasons and meet one or more of the following indicators:**


1. The number of eligible children in a zip code remaining “unserved” is at or above 100.  
(94002, 94014, 94015, 94303, 94025, 94044, 94061, 94062-RWC, 94063, 94066, 94080, 94401, 94402, 94403)
2. The percentage of eligible children in a zip code remaining “unserved” is at or above 80% of the total number of eligible children, and there are in excess of 50 children remaining unserved. (94010, 94030, 94070)
3. The zip code is in the rural San Mateo County Coastside where there was a serious census undercount of those in poverty. Other indicators\* substantiate the “need” as high, and available subsidized child care is low or non-existent.  
(94018, 94019, 94020, 94021, 94037, 94038, 94060, 94074)  
*(\*percentage of Medi-Cal eligible births percentage of children eligible for free and reduced school lunches number of births to teens, few, if any subsidized child care spaces)*

The Council has refrained from ranking within the priority group. It has indicated where to split a zip code area in order to prioritize funding for the neediest part, and in other circumstances has excluded some zip codes that did not meet the criteria.

**Fiscal Impact:**

San Mateo County will receive \$ 674,298. This should provide funds for approximately 100 new spaces for income eligible children birth to 5 years old. Statewide, the total annualized funds available are \$80 million FY 2000/01.

There are currently over 1200 full-day General Child Care and Development spaces in San Mateo County serving children 5 years and younger. The last allocation of General Child Care and Development funding was in 1998. At that time, San Mateo County was awarded \$ 164,471, enough funding for only 28 spaces.

## **PURPOSE STATEMENT**

The Purpose of the Child Care Partnership Council of San Mateo County is to develop, promote and update a plan, collaboratively, for a comprehensive, countywide, childcare and development system which will accomplish the following:

- ◆ Support families;
- ◆ value parental choice and responsibilities;
- ◆ value child care professionals; and
- ◆ ensure that all children have access to high quality, affordable care.

and will ensure the following outcomes:

- ◆ children's healthy development and school success, and;
- ◆ a stronger, healthier community.

### **What is the San Mateo Child Care Partnership Council?**

Local Child Care and Development Planning Councils were established by the state legislature in 1991 in every county in California. In San Mateo County, the Child Care Partnership Council is the local planning council. In 1997 with the event of welfare reform, the role of child care planning councils was strengthened through AB 1542 and the implementation of CaLWORKS. (See *Education Code*, Sections 8499.3 *et. seq.* and 54744)

### **Why was the San Mateo Child Care Partnership Council formed?**

The purpose of the Child Care Partnership Council is to provide a forum for the identification of local priorities for child care; and to develop policies to meet the needs identified within those priorities. The Child Care Partnership Council makes decisions around the local distribution of state child care funding. The Child Care Partnership Council is also mandated to conduct a community-wide needs assessment for child care and to develop a comprehensive county-wide plan for child care for all children.

### **When and where do they meet?**

The Child Care Partnership Council meets monthly. The meetings are open to the public. The meetings are held on the fourth Monday of every month from 9:00 – 11:00 a.m. at the San Mateo County Office of Education.

**Who is on the Council?**

The Council is co-chaired by Dr. Gonella, County Superintendent of Schools and County Supervisor Mary Griffin. Members must include consumers of child care, child care providers, and public and community agency representatives. There are 22 voting members of the San Mateo Child Care Partnership Council. The County Superintendent of Schools and the County Board of Supervisors are responsible for the appointment of members. They serve as co-chairs of the Council.

**Why is this hearing being conducted?**

The Child Care Partnership Council is required by the California Department of Education, Child Development Division to set priorities for the distribution of upcoming funding for subsidized child care. The funding is for half-day State Preschool for 3 and 4 year olds, and full-day General Child Development for children 0 – 5 years. The Child Care Partnership Council is also required to obtain public input on its recommended priorities. That is the purpose of this hearing.

**What will be done with my concerns and opinions?**

The public input which is received at this hearing will be heard and considered by the full Child Care Partnership Council. The final recommended priorities must be approved by the County Board of Supervisors and the County Superintendent of Schools. The approved priorities must then be reported to the California Department of Education, Child Development Division by January 30, 2001.

**What else must happen?**

The California Department of Education, Child Development Division must decide how much funding each county will receive for these two child care programs. Each county will then receive application forms (Requests for Application – RFA's). The eligible child care providers and agencies will complete and return the applications. This is a competitive process. The Department of Education will have the applications read and scored.

Contracts will be offered to the highest scoring applicants in each county according to the priorities and available funding.

*It is estimated that the awards for this new funding will not be announced until mid-2001.*

**I'm a child care provider, how do I apply?**

The Requests for Application (RFA) should be available soon. You may contact the California Department of Education, Child Development Division at (916) 322-6233 or [www.cde.ca.gov/cyfsbranch/child\\_development](http://www.cde.ca.gov/cyfsbranch/child_development). RFAs should also be received by the Child Care Coordinating Council (650)696-8780 and the Child Care Partnership Council at the San Mateo County Office of Education (650) 802-5623.

**I'm a parent who needs subsidized child care. How do I apply for these new funds?**

It is best to contact the Child Care Coordinating Council's Parent Referral Line at 696-8787. The Council is the designated agency for child care referrals in the County. They can provide parents with the appropriate information regarding subsidized care. They will also place eligible families on a centralized eligibility list for care, and inform eligible parents of the child care subsidy options throughout San Mateo County. These location of these new funds will be incorporated into the information that Child Care Coordinating Council will have available.

# GENERAL CHILD CARE FOR 0 – 5 YEARS

## PRIORITY SETTING – 12/18/00

### Recommendations to Child Care Partnership Council

**On 12/6/00 Kristen Anderson, Ann Sims, Vivian Cho and Jeanie McLoughlin met to review the task, the data and make preliminary recommendations for the Child Care Partnership Council Priorities. Funds will be for General Child Care for children 0 – 5 years old.**

#### **TASK:**

*To determine where the “underserved” areas in San Mateo County are in regard to the need for full-day General Child Care and Development expansion funds FY 00/01, and make a recommendation to the full Council for priority setting.*

**Underserved** is defined as “a county or subcounty area where the ratio of publicly subsidized child care to the need for these services is low”. CDD wants priorities to be given in zip codes, whenever possible. Problems arise if defining by school districts, census tracts and other definitions.

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION:**

Statewide the expansion funds in the state budget for General Child Care are \$ 40 million FY 2000-20001. It is not yet known how much is allocated to San Mateo County. These funds will be annualized at \$ 80 million. The last time full-day General Child Care funding expansion was released was two years ago for Infant and Toddlers (0 – 30 mos.) only.

#### **INDICATORS OF NEED:**

- Number of children in each zip code, living in families with less than 75% State Median Income (SMI) (*Fall 1998, San Mateo County Child Care Needs Assessment - 1999-2000*)
  - 75% SMI = \$31,600 family of 2 / \$37,600 family of 4
  - 60% SMI = \$29,148 family of 2 / \$36,312 family of 4
- Number and percentage of Medi-Cal eligible births by zip code.  
(*1999, San Mateo County Department of Health Services*)
- Number and percentage of children in TANF in each zip code.  
(*November 2000 San Mateo County Human Services Agency*)
- Percentage of public school enrollment in each zip code receiving Free/Reduced Meals. (*Fall 1999, San Mateo County Office of Education*)
- Number of children (0 – 24 months, and 24 – 72 months) in each zip code on the Child Care Coordinating Council’s Centralized Eligibility List.  
(*November 2000, Child Care Coordinating Council of San Mateo County, Inc*)
- Number of children born to teen-age mothers in each zip code.  
(*1999, San Mateo County Department of Health Services*)

## **SUPPLY OF CHILD CARE INDICATORS:**

### **• Full-day Subsidy slots, include:**

- a) Actual count of children receiving child care subsidy from Alternative Payment Programs (APP) and CalWORKS Stages 1,2 & 3 contracts with PACE, Child Care Coordinating Council and San Mateo County Human Services Agency. *11/2000*
- b) Actual count of children being served by all CDE funded child care centers, and full-day Federal HeadStart. Data provided by each contracted provider. *12/2000*
- c) Actual count of children being served by Family Service Agency's Neighborhood Child Care Program and Early HeadStart. FSA has CDE funded child care in homes in San Mateo Menlo Park, Redwood City and East Palo Alto. *12/2000*

**Part-day Subsidy slots were not included.** The rationale is that children needing full-day child care with working families will not be impacted by the half-day only preschool programs (State Preschool and HeadStart) for 3 – 5 year olds.

### **Calculation of Number and Percent Unserved:**

The number of children estimated to need care in each zip code is calculated by multiplying the number of children at less than 75% SMI by the Labor Force Participation rate in each zip code, to arrive at the number of income eligible children with working families who need child care.

The number and percentage of children remaining unserved in each zip codes is calculated by subtracting the total number of children receiving subsidized child care services from the total number of children estimated to need care (*above*).

# STATE PRESCHOOL PRIORITY SETTING – 12/18/00

## Recommendations to Child Care Partnership Council

**On 12/6/00 Kristen Anderson, Ann Sims, Vivian Cho and Jeanie McLoughlin met to review the task, the data and make preliminary recommendations to the Child Care Partnership Council for State Preschool Priorities.**

### **TASK:**

*To determine where the “underserved” areas in San Mateo County are in regard to the need for half-day state preschool expansion funds FY 00/01, and make a recommendation to the full Council for priority setting.*

**Underserved** is defined as “a county or subcounty area where the ratio of publicly subsidized child care to the need for these services is low”. CDD wants priorities to be given in zip codes, whenever possible. Problems arise if defining by school districts, census tracts and other definitions.

### **GENERAL INFORMATION:**

The expansion funds in the state budget for State Preschool are \$34 million FY 2000-20001. It is not yet known how much is allocated to San Mateo County. These funds will be annualized at \$ 68 million. (Compare to last years funds of \$23 million half-year / \$46 million annualized.)

Last year San Mateo County was awarded \$ 1.03 million in State Preschool funding. This translated to an additional 372 half-day preschool spaces. It is increasingly difficult to fill half-day preschool spaces, due to the need for full day child care.

- Number of children (0 – 24 months, and 24 – 72 months) in each zip code on the Child Care Coordinating Council’s Centralized Eligibility List.

- Number of children born to teen-age mothers in each zip code.

## **SUPPLY OF CHILD CARE INDICATORS:**

### **• Full-day Subsidy slots, include:**

- a) Actual count of children receiving child care subsidy from Alternative Payment Programs (APP) and CalWORKS Stages 1,2 & 3 contracts with PACE, Child Care Coordinating Council and San Mateo County Human Services Agency. *11/2000*
- b) Actual count of children being served by all CDE funded child care centers, and full-day Federal HeadStart. Data provided by each contracted provider. *12/2000*
- c) Actual count of children being served by Family Service Agency's Neighborhood Child Care Program. FSA has CDE funded child care in homes in San Mateo Menlo Park, Redwood City and East Palo Alto, and Early HeadStart *12/2000*

### **Part-day Subsidy slots, include:**

- a) Actual count of children being served by State Preschool (CDE contracted), and Federal HeadStart programs in San Mateo County. State Preschool and HeadStart are mostly part-day programs for 3-5 year olds in center based environments. Data provided by SMCOE, IHSD and contracted programs. *12/2000*

### **Calculation of Number and Percent Unserved:**

The number and percentage of children remaining unserved in each zip codes is calculated by subtracting the total number of children receiving subsidized child care services from the number of children at less than 75% SMI. Since work force participation is not a family eligibility factor for State Preschool, the Labor Force Participation rate in each zip code was not applied as it is in the General 0 – 5 year old Child Care calculations.

## **Zip Code Priorities Recommended by Committee for 2000/01**

### **State Preschool Funding:**

Using various indicators of need, a committee of the Child Care Partnership Council decided on December 6, 1999 to recommend the following zip code priorities for the Fiscal Year 2000/01 State Preschool funding for San Mateo County as follows:

**The following zip codes in San Mateo County are “unserved or underserved” in the ratio of publicly subsidized child care to the need for these services:**

**94002, 94010 (Burlingame, but not Hillsborough), 94014, 94015, 94018, 94019, 94020, 94021, 94037, 94038, 94303, 94025, 94044, 94030, 94060, 94061, 94063, 94066, 94070, 94074, 94080, 94404**

**The zip codes have been designated a priority for the following reasons and meet one or more of the following indicators:**

1. The number of eligible children in a zip code remaining “unserved” is at or above 100.  
(94002, 94010, 94014, 94015, 94303, 94025, 94030, 94044, 94061, 94063, 94066, 94070, 94080)
2. The percentage of eligible children in a zip code remaining “unserved” is at or above 80% of the total number of eligible children, and there are in excess of 50 children remaining unserved. (94404)
3. The zip code is in the rural San Mateo County Coastside where there was a serious census undercount of those in poverty. Other indicators\* substantiate the “need” as high, and available subsidized child care is low or non-existent.  
(94018, 94019, 94020, 94021, 94038, 94037, 94060, 94074)  
(\*percentage of Medi-Cal eligible births, percentage of children eligible for free and reduced school lunches, number of births to teens, few, if any subsidized child care spaces)

The recommendations exclude ten zip codes from prioritization. The zip codes excluded are:
