Agreements with Children and Families First and Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health

RECOMMENDATION

Adopt a resolution authorizing the President of the Board to execute Agreements with the Children and Families First Commission of San Mateo County and the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health for the Prenatal to Three Initiative and approving Amendment to the Salary Ordinance, and

Approve an Appropriation Transfer Request (ATR) in the amount of \$409,442, \$293,917 to Prenatal to Three, \$87,977 to Mental Health and \$27,548 to Public Health

Background

The evaluation of the Prenatal to Three Initiative (PTT) has revealed many positive outcomes, including the following

- San Mateo County mothers had a higher rate of breastfeeding (88%) than mothers in the comparison counties of Santa Clara and Solano (76% and 79%)
- PTT children had one more well baby visit on average than children seen before the program began
- PTT parents showed picture books to their infants 45% more than non-PTT families
- Women at high risk of mental health disorder who are enrolled in PTT received therapeutic services more often than such women in comparison counties
- More PTT children from families with mental health problems were identified as at risk and treated earlier in their lives for emotional and relationship disorders

The PTT program is increasingly cost efficient with the cost per PTT home visit reduced from \$164 in year one, to \$101 in year three. Last year, PTT provided home-based services to 1,700 families with children in the prenatal to three Medi-Cal population. Mental Health staff of PTT served approximately 240 of these families who had diagnosable mental health problems and their numbers continue to increase.

Discussion

PTT has been awarded a two-year grant from Children and Families First as part of the first group of grants given by this new funding source for services to children aged zero to five years in San Mateo County. The goal of the grant is to widen efforts to provide public health nurse assessments to pregnant women and newborns on Medi-Cal, and to make specialized services available to families at risk due to social or mental health factors. PTT will achieve these goals through efforts of its collaborating teams and programs, and the addition of three, full-time, unclassified, Public Health Nurses for PTT, one full-time, unclassified, Psychiatric Social Worker II for Mental Health and one full-time Community Program Specialist II for Public Health. Through the grant, several hundred more Medi-Cal enrolled mothers and infants will receive preventive and early intervention services each year.

Specifically, the grant will allow the following objectives to be met

By December 2001	
•	at least 30 additional PTT clients will receive specialized mental health assessment, treatment and medications as appropriate
By December 2002	
•	90% of families with Medi-Cal and PTT aged children will be offered home visits
•	at least three psychiatrists will report competence in the assessment and treatment of pregnant, post-partum and lactating women
•	90% of families with Medi-Cal and prenatal-to-three aged children will place their babies on their backs or sides to sleep
•	90% of families with Medi-Cal will breastfeed their infants
•	at least 25 African-American families with prenatal-to-three aged children in North County will receive BIH outreach and case management services

PTT has also been awarded a two-year grant from the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health to plan and implement parent education classes that will focus on primary abuse and neglect prevention, for at-risk families on Medi-Cal who have children up to three years of age PTT philosophy and design have supported the concept of a family strength-based program to promote optimal physical and emotional development of the child within the family unit. Since its inception in 1996, Pre-To-Three has offered home visits and drop-in parent support groups (Touchpoints) to pregnant women and families of young children on Medi-Cal in San Mateo County. Missing in the mix of home-based services are specific programs designed to provide parenting skill strengthening and support to those identified as having greater than usual problems in fulfilling their parenting roles and before child abuse and neglect occurs. This funding will enable PTT, along with community collaborators and parents, to develop a group parenting skills program designed to foster positive parent-child relationships. Implementation will include activities related

to (a) choosing and adapting a proven and effective curriculum, (b) staff training, (c) providing at least ten Family Strengthening Courses, and (d) evaluating the courses

Term and Fiscal Impact

The term of the Children and Families First grant is January 1, 2001 through December 31, 2002. The total grant award for this two-year period is \$994,107, of which \$263,594 will be used to pay for new salaries and benefits, contracts and services during FY 2000-01. In the FY 2001-02 and 2002-03 budgets, \$730,513 will be included from this grant to continue to pay for salaries and benefits, contracts and services related to the project. In all three affected fiscal years, the grant will be used to pay for the local match for services that will be billed to Medi-Cal. The grant also specifically pays for Mental Health services to the uninsured. Future funding for the classified Public Health position is anticipated to come from the State or from grants. The other positions are unclassified and will be eliminated if no additional funding can be identified after the grant period ends. There is no net county cost.

The term of Lucile Packard Foundation grant is from December 2000 to December 2002. The total grant award for this two-year period is \$250,000, \$30,323 for FY 2000-2001, \$169,677 for FY 2001-2002, and \$50,000 for FY 2002-2003. Funds will be used for existing project staff salaries and non-personnel items such as translation and interpreter services and incentives for program participants. There is no net county cost

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this Board of Supervisors for its consideration and acceptance an Award Letter and Agreement with the David and Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health, reference to which is hereby made for further particulars, whereby the County of San Mateo Prenatal to Three Initiative will use it for the Pre-to-Three Parent Education Project, and

WHEREAS, this Board has been presented with the forms of these Agreements and has examined and approved them as to both form and content and desires to enter into the Agreements, and

WHEREAS, this Board desires to create the positions necessary to carry out this work,

SECTION 1. Part 12 of the Ordinance 03987 is amended as indicated

1 Item B112S, Mental Health Case Worker series - unclassified, is increased by 1 position for a new total of 1 position

ORGANIZATION 62000 PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES

1 Item G226S, Community Program Specialist series, is increased by 1 position for a new total of 7 positions

ORGANIZATION 62800 PRENATAL TO THREE PROGRAM

1 Item B100, Public Health Nurse - unclassified, is increased by 3 positions for a new total of 3 positions

SECTION 2. This action is effective thirty days following adoption

AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CHILDREN & FAMILIES FIRST COMMISSION OF SAN MATEO COUNTY AND

SAN MATEO COUNTY HEALTH SERVICES AGENCY, DIVISION OF PUBLIC HEALTH (Prenatal to Three Initiative)

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this 1st day of January 2001 by and between the Children & Families First Commission hereinafter called Commission and San Mateo County Health Services Agency Division of Public Health (Prenatal to Three Initiative) hereinafter called Contractor

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code Section 31000 Commission may contract with independent contractors for the furnishing of such services to or for the Commission and

WHEREAS, the Exhibit A Project Services and Exhibit B Payments are attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein

WHEREFORE, the Commission and Contractor agree as follows

1 Services to be Performed

In consideration of the payments hereinafter set forth in Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein. Contractor under the general direction of the Executive Director of the Commission or his/her authorized representative with respect to the product or result of Contractor's services shall perform services as described in Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein. Contractor shall ensure compliance with all state federal and local laws or rules applicable to performance of the work required under this contract which includes increasing access of Prenatal to Three Initiative services to 400 additional families as well as enhancing mental health services to Prenatal to Three Initiative clients.

Exhibits A and B and their attachments reflect the scope of work and budget for the entire term of the contract January 01 2001 to December 31 2002. It is understood and agreed that Contractor will submit an updated scope of work and budget for the succeeding year by December 1 2001 and receive written approval from the Executive Director on behalf of the Commission prior to commencing the second year. It is anticipated that the budget will be amended with written approval of the Executive Director, upon review of the prior year sprogress reports.

2 Contract Term

The term of this Agreement shall be from January 1 2001 to December 31 2002. This Agreement is subject to the termination provisions noted in paragraph 8 and subject further to the agreement provided for in paragraphs 3 C and 12 that there are reports due followed by final payment and evaluation required which occur after December 31 2002. Contractor further agrees that the requirements of this Agreement pertaining to release of records in paragraph 9, and retention of records in paragraph 10 shall survive the termination of this Agreement

3 Payments

- A. Maximum Amount. In full consideration of Contractor's performance of the services described in Exhibit A, the amount that the Commission shall be obligated to pay for services rendered under this Agreement shall not exceed NINE HUNDRED NINETY FOUR THOUSAND, ONE HUNDRED SEVEN DOLLARS (\$994,107) for the term as follows Year 1 \$500 000 (January–December 2001) Year 2 \$494 107 (January–December 2002)
- B Rate of Payment. The rate of payment shall be as specified in Exhibit B. Each payment shall be conditioned on the performance of the services described in Exhibit A to the full satisfaction of the Executive Director, on behalf of the Commission

- Completion of the 6^h and 12^h month of each funded year under this Agreement for services to the Commission for payment in accordance with the provisions of Exhibit B. The first report, therefore, shall be due seven months from execution of this Agreement. Guidelines for progress reports will be provided by the Commission staff and shall include a descriptive narrative tracking of the approved timeline and workplan and a detailed financial accounting of all grant funds spent in comparison with the approved budget. Any substantial changes to the approved workplan and/or timeline must be approved by the Commission. Guidelines for such changes will be provided by the Commission staff.
- Availability of Funds. Payment for all services provided pursuant to this Agreement is contingent upon the availability of funds under Proposition 10. In the event such funds are not provided or not available to the San Mateo County Children & Families First Commission, the Commission shall not be liable for any payment whatsoever including but not limited to payments that are based on Commission funds. The Commission may terminate the agreement for unavailability of State funds. In this event, the Commission shall, through its Executive Director, inform Contractor of such unavailability as soon as it is known, and to the extent legally possible pay all outstanding amounts due.
- E <u>Supplantation</u> Funds persuant to this Agreement are provided pursuant to Proposition 10 and are intended to supplement expand upon and enhance activities funded from existing sources. Contractor shall not use funds under this Agreement to supplant existing resources or services.

4 Relationship of Parties

It is expressly understood that this is an agreement between two (2) independent contractors and that no agency employee partnership joint venture or other relationship is established by this Agreement. The intent by both the Commission and Contractor is to create an independent contractor relationship. Contractor expressly acknowledges and accepts his/her tax status as and the tax consequences of an independent contractor.

5 Non-Discrimination

Contractor shall comply with the non-discrimination requirements described below

A Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973

- 1) Pursuant to Section 504 (Public Law 93-112) the Contractor agrees that no otherwise qualified disabled individual shall solely by reason of a disability be excluded from the participation in be denied the benefits of or be subjected to discrimination in the performance of this contract
- 2) Compliance of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 as amended requires that all benefits a ds and services are made available to disabled persons on an equivalent basis with those received by non-disabled persons. Contractor shall agree to be in compliance with Section 504 requirements by developing a plan for compliance to be submitted to the Section 504 Coordinator, Department of Health Services as soon as possible but not later than by the end of the current Fiscal Year.
- B <u>Non-Discrimination General</u>. No person shall on the grounds of age (over 40) ancestry creed color disability marital status medical conditions national origin political or religious affiliation, race sex sexual orientation or any non-job-related criteria be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits or be subjected to discrimination under this Agreement.
- C <u>Non-Discrimination Employment</u>. Contractor shall ensure equal employment opportunity based on objective standards of recruitment, selection, promotion classification, compensation performance evaluations and management relations for all employees under this Agreement Contractor's equal employment opportunity policies shall be made available to the Commission upon request

6 Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting.

Contractor agrees to ensure that all known or suspected instances of child abuse or neglect are reported to a child protective agency as defined in Penal Code Section 11165 9 This responsibility shall include

- A requirement that all employees consultants or agents performing services under this contract who are required by Penal Code Section 11166(a) to report child abuse or neglect sign a statement that he or she knows of the reporting requirement and will comply with it
- B Establishing procedures to ensure reporting even when employees consultants or agents who are <u>not</u> required to report child abuse under Penal Code 11166(a) gain knowledge of or reasonably suspect that a child has been a victim of abuse or neglect
- Contractor agrees that its employees subcontractors assignees volunteers and any other persons who provide services under this contract and who will have supervisory or disciplinary power over a minor or any person under his or her care (Penal 11105 3) will be fingerprinted in order to determine whether they have a criminal history which would compromise the safety of children with whom Contractor's employees subcontractors assignees or volunteers have contact. All fingerprinting services will be at County's sole discretion and Contractor's sole expense.

7 Assignments and Subcontracts

- A Without the written consent of the Executive Director of the Commission or his/her designee this Agreement is not assignable in whole or in part. Any assignment by Contractor without the written consent of the Executive Director of the Commission or his/her designee violates this Agreement and shall automatically terminate this Agreement.
- B All assignees subcontractors or consultants approved in writing by the Executive Director of the Commission or his/her designee shall be subject to the same terms and conditions applicable to Contractor under this Agreement and Contractor shall be liable for the assignee's subcontractors or consultants acts and/or omissions

8 Termination of Agreement

The Executive Director, on behalf of the Commission may at any time from execution of Agreement term nate this Agreement in whole or in part, for the convenience of the Commission by giving written notice spec fying the effective date and scope of such termination. Termination shall be effective on a date not less than thirty days from notice. In the event of termination all finished or unfinished documents data studies maps photographs reports and materials (pereafter referred to as materials) prepared by Contractor under this Agreement shall become the property of the Commission and shall be promptly delivered to the Commission. In the event of termination Contractor shall be paid for all work satisfactorily performed until termination except where the contracting department determines the quality or quantity of the work performed is unacceptable. Such payment shall be that portion of the full payment, which is determined by comparing the work/services completed to the work/services required by the Agreement.

9 Release of Records

All data produced compiled, and obtained in connection with the performance of this contract shall not be disclosed without notification to the Commission staff. All data produced or compiled by Contractor shall be considered confidential unless it can be obtained as a public record and shall not be shared with a third party without notifying the Commission staff.

10 Records

- A Contractor agrees to provide to the Commission, to any Federal or State department having monitoring or reviewing authority, to Commission's authorized representatives and/or their appropriate audit agencies upon reasonable notice, access to and the right to examine and audit all records and documents necessary to determine compliance with relevant Federal, State, and local statutes rules and regulations and this Agreement and to evaluate the quality appropriateness and timeliness of services performed.
- B Contractor shall maintain and preserve all records relating to this Agreement in its possession of any third party performing work related to this Agreement for a period of three (3) years from the termination date of this Agreement, or until audit findings are resolved whichever is greater

C All data produced or compiled by Contractor shall be considered confidential unless it can be obtained as public record and shall not be shared with a third party without the prior written consent of the Commission All data produced compiled and obtained in connection with the performance of this contract shall not be disclosed without the prior consent of the Commission

11 Compliance with Applicable Laws

All services to be performed by Contractor pursuant to this Agreement shall be performed in accordance with all applicable Federal State County and Municipal laws ordinances regulations including but not limited to appropriate licensure certification regulations confidentiality requirements and applicable quality assurance regulations

12 Monitoring/Evaluation

Contractor shall track achievement of program objectives and the process and outcome measures for this project as they are described in the Scope of Work attached hereto as Attachment A and included herein as if fully set forth or as revised in collaboration with the Commission's Evaluator and approved in writing by the Executive Director on behalf of the Commission during the term of this contract. Contractor shall participate in a countywide evaluation of the effectiveness of Proposition 10 efforts, whether it occurs during the term of this contract or after

13 Alteration of Agreement

This Agreement is entire and contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties — No alteration or variation shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties hereto or as permitted by the terms of this Agreement and no oral understanding or agreement shall be binding on the parties hereto

14 Interpretation and Enforcement
