Grant from The Children and Families First Commission to Promote Breastfeeding

RECOMMENDATION

1. Adopt a resolution authorizing the President of the Board of Supervisors to execute an agreement with the Children and Families First Commission to expand services provided by the WIC Breastfeeding Care Center.

Background

The WIC program is targeted to low-income pregnant and breastfeeding women, infants, and children up to five years of age, determined by a health professional to be at "nutritional risk".

From September 1993 through July 1994, only 28% of the San Mateo WIC clients initiated breastfeeding; 11.6% of which continued for five or more months. Since that time, the San Mateo County WIC program, in collaboration with other interested San Mateo County health care providers, has worked to increase the breastfeeding initiation and duration rate of participants. In 1995, WIC formed the Breastfeeding Care Center (BCC) with discretionary funds from the California WIC Branch. The WIC BCC took the lead in collaborative efforts of the San Mateo County health care providers to increase the breastfeeding initiation and duration rate.

The November 2000 WIC report indicated that 73% of San Mateo WIC babies aged four weeks or younger were breastfed and 41% of babies aged six months were still breastfed. However, less than 12% of WIC babies were exclusively breastfed. Enhancing and expanding existing Breastfeeding Care Center resources and services is needed to promote and support breastfeeding among WIC clients to meet the project goal.

Discussion

One of the goals of the Children and Families First Commission (CFFC) is for all children to have

good health. An objective related to this goal is to increase the percent of new mothers who breastfeed. There are many physical benefits associated with children who are breastfed, including promoting attachment between mother and infant. Earlier this year, the WIC program submitted a grant application to CFFC and subsequently, a grant in the amount of \$738,120 was awarded to promote breastfeeding in San Mateo County.

The funding provided by the CFFC will enhance the current breastfeeding support services provided by the county to WIC mothers. It will support program planning, as well as oversight of and direction to support staff. Intensive breastfeeding education and support to WIC mothers will be available at all six WIC sites.

Outcome Objectives

The following outcome objectives related to this project will be measured in 2001-2002:

Term and Fiscal Impact

The term of the contract will be July 1, 2001 to June 30, 2002. It is renewable yearly until June 30, 2004. The total funding from the grant is \$738,120 over a three-year period, \$272,369 for FY 2001-02; \$245,132 for FY 2002-03, and \$220,619 for FY 2003-04. This grant covers the costs of additional staff time, operating costs, capital expenditures, and some indirect costs. \$272,369 in expenditures and revenue were included in the FY 2001-02 budget. There is no new net county cost.

RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Mateo, State of California, that;

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this Board of Supervisors for its consideration and acceptance an agreement, reference to which is hereby made for further particulars, whereby Children and Families First Commission shall expand services provided by the WIC Breastfeeding Care Center; and

WHEREAS, this Board has been presented with a form of the Agreement and has examined and approved it as to both form and content and desires to enter into the Agreement:

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY DETERMINED AND ORDERED that the Board hereby authorizes the President of this Board of Supervisors to execute said Agreement with Children and Families First Commission for and on behalf of the County of San Mateo, and the Clerk of this Board shall attest the President's signature thereto.

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AGREEMENT BETWEEN SAN MATEO COUNTY CHILDREN & FAMILIES FIRST COMMISSION AND SAN MATEO COUNTY HEALTH SERVICES AGENCY, DIVISION OF PUBLIC HEALTH (WIC PROGRAM)

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this 1st day of July, 2001, by and between the San Mateo County Children & Families First Commission, hereinafter called "Commission," and San Mateo County Health Services Agency, Division of Public Health (WIC Program), hereinafter called "Contractor."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, pursuant to Health & Safety Code Section 130100 et seq., Commission may contract with independent contractors for the furnishing of such services to or for the Commission; and

WHEREAS, the Exhibit A, Project Services and Exhibit B. Payments, are attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein;

WHEREFORE, the Commission and Contractor agree as follows:

1. Services to be Performed

In consideration of the payments hereinafter set forth in Exhibit B, attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, Contractor under the general direction of the Executive Director of the Commission, or his/her authorized representative, with respect to the product or result of Contractor's services, shall perform services as described in Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, which includes: conducting breastfeeding classes to WIC clients; purchasing and providing incentive items for nursing mothers; establishing and staffing a toll-free breastfeeding help line; making phone calls to pregnant WIC clients; providing in-service training for healthcare providers; conducting breastfeeding outreach and media activities; and purchasing and providing loans of electric breast pumps to working mothers. Contractor shall ensure compliance with all state, federal and local laws or rules applicable to performance of the work required under this contract.

Exhibits A and B and their attachments reflect the scope of work and budget for the first year of the contract, July 01, 2001 to June 30, 2002. It is understood and agreed that Contractor will submit an updated scope of work and budget for each succeeding year by June 01, 2002 and 2003, respectively and receive written approval from the Executive Director, after consultation with the Chair of the Commission, prior to commencing the second and third year provided, however, that there shall be no change in the maximum amount payable under this Agreement. It is anticipated that the scope of work and budget will be amended, with written approval of the Executive Director, upon review of the Contractor's prior year's progress reports.

2. Contract Term

The term of this Agreement shall be from July 01, 2001 to June 30, 2004, subject to the termination provisions noted in paragraph 8, and subject further to the agreement provided for in paragraphs 3.C and 12, that there are reports due followed by evaluation and final payment which occur after June 30, 2004. Contractor further agrees that the requirements of this Agreement pertaining to retention of records in paragraph 9, and title in paragraph 10, shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

3. Payments

A. Maximum Amount. In full consideration of Contractor's performance of the services described in Exhibit A, the amount that the Commission shall be obligated to pay for services rendered under this Agreement shall not exceed SEVEN HUNDRED AND THIRTY EIGHT THOUSAND, ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY DOLLARS (\$738,120) for the term as follows: Year 1 - \$272,369 (July 2001 – June 2002), Year 2 - \$245,132 (July 2002 – June 2003), and Year 3 - \$220,619 (July 2003 – June 2004).

- B. Rate of Payment. The rate of payment shall be as specified in Exhibit B. Each payment shall be conditioned on the performance of the services described in Exhibit A to the full satisfaction of the Executive Director, on behalf of the Commission.
- C. <u>Time Limit for Submitting</u>. Contractor shall submit semi-annual progress reports within 30 days of completion of the 6th and 12th month of each funded year under this Agreement for services to the Commission for payment in accordance with the provisions of Exhibit B. The first report, therefore, shall be due January 31, 2002. Guidelines for progress reports will be provided by the Commission staff and shall include a descriptive narrative, tracking of the approved timeline and work plan, and a detailed financial accounting of all grant funds spent in comparison with the approved budget. The Commission must approve any substantial changes to the approved work plan and/or timeline. The Commission staff will provide guidelines for such changes.
- D. Availability of Funds. Payment for all services provided pursuant to this Agreement is contingent upon the availability of funds under Proposition 10. In the event such funds are not provided or not available to the San Mateo County Children & Families First Commission, the Commission shall not be liable for any payment whatsoever; including, but not limited to, payments that are based on Commission funds. The Commission may terminate the agreement for unavailability of State funds. In this event, the Commission shall, through its Executive Director, inform Contractor of such unavailability as soon as it is known, and to the extent legally possible pay all outstanding amounts due.
- E. <u>Supplantation</u>. Funds pursuant to this Agreement are provided pursuant to Proposition 10 and are intended to supplement, expand upon, and enhance activities funded from existing sources. Contractor shall not use funds under this Agreement to supplant existing resources or services.

4. Relationship of Parties

Contractor agrees and understands that the work/services performed under this Agreement are performed as an Independent Contractor to the Commission and this contract does not confer any rights, privileges, powers or advantages of the Commission or County employees upon Contractor.

5. Non-Discrimination

Contractor shall comply with the non-discrimination requirements described below:

- A. <u>Non-Discrimination General</u>. No person shall, on the grounds of age (over 40), ancestry, creed, color, disability, marital status, medical conditions, national origin, political or religious affiliation, race, sex, sexual orientation or any non-job-related criteria be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits, or be subjected to discrimination under this Agreement.
- B. <u>Non-Discrimination Employment</u>. Contractor shall ensure equal employment opportunity based on objective standards of recruitment, selection, promotion, classification, compensation, performance evaluations, and management relations, for all employees under this Agreement. Contractor's equal employment opportunity policies shall be made available to the Commission upon request.

Violation of the non-discrimination provisions of this Agreement shall be considered a breach of this Agreement and subject the Contractor to penalties, to be determined by the Executive Director after consultation with the Chair of the Commission, including but not limited to:

i) termination of this Agreement; ii) disqualification of the Contractor from bidding on or being awarded a Commission or County of San Mateo contract for a period of up to 3 years; iii) liquidated damages of \$2,500 per violation; iv) imposition of other appropriate contractual and civil remedies and sanctions, as determined by the Executive Director, on behalf of the Commission.

To effectuate the provisions of this paragraph, the Executive Director shall have the authority to: i) examine Contractor's employment records with respect to compliance with this paragraph; ii) set off all or any portion of the amount described in this paragraph against amounts due to Contractor under the Contract or any other Contract between Contractor and the Commission or the County of San Mateo. Contractor shall report to the Executive Director the filing by any person in any court of any complaint of discrimination or the filing by any person of any and all charges with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, the Fair Employment and Housing Commission or any other entity charged with the investigation of allegations within 30 days of such filing, provided that within such 30 days such entity has not notified Contractor that such charges are dismissed or otherwise unfounded. Such

notification shall include the name of the complainant, a copy of such complaint and a description of the circumstance. Contractor shall provide the Commission with a copy of its response to the Complaint when filed.

6. Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting.

Contractor agrees to ensure that all known or suspected instances of child abuse or neglect are reported to a child protective agency as defined in Penal Code Section 11165.9. This responsibility shall include:

- A. A requirement that all employees, consultants, or agents performing services under this contract who are required by Penal Code Section 11166(a), to report child abuse or neglect, sign a statement that he or she knows of the reporting requirement and will comply with it.
- B. Establishing procedures to ensure reporting even when employees, consultants, or agents who are <u>not required</u> to report child abuse under Penal Code 11166(a), gain knowledge of, or reasonably suspect that a child has been a victim of abuse or neglect.
- C. Contractor agrees that its employees, subcontractors, assignees, volunteers, and any other persons who provide services under this contract and who will have supervisory or disciplinary power over a minor or any person under his or her care (Penal 11105.3) will be fingerprinted in order to determine whether they have
 - a criminal history which would compromise the safety of children with whom Contractor's employees, subcontractors, assignees or volunteers have contact. All fingerprinting services will be at Commission's sole discretion and Contractor's sole expense.

7. Assignments and Subcontracts

- A. Without the written consent of the Executive Director of the Commission or his/her designee, this Agreement is not assignable in whole or in part. Any assignment by Contractor without the written consent of the Executive Director of the Commission or his/her designee violates this Agreement and shall automatically terminate this Agreement.
- B. All assignees, subcontractors, or consultants approved in writing by the Executive Director of the Commission or his/her designee shall be subject to the same terms and conditions applicable to Contractor under this Agreement, and Contractor shall be liable for the assignee's, subcontractor's or consultant's acts and/or omissions.

8. Termination of Agreement

The Executive Director, after consultation with the Chair of the Commission, may at any time from execution of Agreement, terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, for the convenience of the Commission, by giving written notice specifying the effective date and scope of such termination. Termination shall be effective on a date not less than thirty days from notice. In the event of termination, all finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, maps, photographs, reports, and materials (hereafter referred to as materials) prepared by Contractor under this Agreement shall become the property of the Commission and shall be promptly delivered to the Commission. In the event of termination, Contractor shall be paid for all work satisfactorily performed until termination, except where the contracting department determines the quality or quantity of the work performed is unacceptable. Such payment shall be that portion of the full payment, which is determined by comparing the work/services completed to the work/services required by the Agreement.

9. Records

- A. Contractor agrees to provide to the Commission, to any Federal or State department having monitoring or reviewing authority, to Commission's authorized representatives and/or their appropriate audit agencies upon reasonable notice, access to and the right to examine and audit all records and documents necessary to determine compliance with relevant Federal, State, and local statutes, rules and regulations, and this Agreement, and to evaluate the quality, appropriateness and timeliness of services performed.
- B. Contractor shall maintain and preserve all records relating to this Agreement in its possession of any third party performing work related to this Agreement for a period of four (4) years from the termination date of this Agreement, or until audit findings are resolved, whichever is greater.
- C. All data produced or compiled by Contractor shall be considered confidential unless it can be obtained as

public record and shall not be shared with a third party without the prior written consent of the Commission. All data produced, compiled, and obtained in connection with the performance of this contract shall not be disclosed without the prior consent of the Commission.

10. <u>Title</u>

All products and concepts, however recorded, prepared or generated by the Contractor in the performance of this Agreement shall be the exclusive property of the San Mateo County Children & Families First Commission. The term "product" as used in the Agreement shall include, but will not be limited to, documentation, findings, design, report, form, evaluation, method of analysis, system, software developed, design documents and concepts related to the work under this Agreement. This Agreement shall preclude Contractor from using or marketing products developed or originated for the Commission hereunder unless and until the parties execute a marketing agreement. All products, inventions, discoveries and improvements developed in the performance of this Agreement while using Commission facilities, including hardware and software shall be the property of the Commission. It shall be presumed that any product, invention, discovery or improvement was developed using Commission facilities unless Contractor is able to show by documented proof that such invention, discovery or improvement was developed solely with Contractor's facilities. If such product, invention, discovery or improvement shall be determined to be the property of Contractor, Commission shall be granted a nonexclusive, irrevocable, royalty free license to use said invention, discovery or improvement.

11. Compliance with Applicable Laws

All services to be performed by Contractor pursuant to this Agreement shall be performed in accordance with all applicable Federal. State, County and Municipal laws, ordinances, regulations, including but not limited to appropriate licensure, certification regulations, confidentiality requirements and applicable quality assurance regulations.

12. Program Monitoring and Evaluation

Contractor shall track achievement of program objectives and the process and outcome measures for this project as they are described in the scope of work, as amended pursuant to this Agreement. Contractor shall cooperate with any Evaluator hired by the Commission to aid in the evaluation process. Contractor shall collect client level data for each funded year and shall participate in a countywide and statewide evaluation of the effectiveness of Proposition 10 efforts, whether it occurs during or after the term of this contract. Contractor shall submit reports as requested by the Executive Director or the Evaluator, and camply with reports as required in the Program Handbook, which include the following:

- 1. A semi-annual and year-end progress report of each funded year.
- 2. An <u>evaluation plan</u> within 90 days of the effective date of this contract, thereby being due October 1, 2001 or as agreed upon by the Executive Director, after consultation with the Chair of the Commission.
- 3. A year-end evaluation report of each funded year.

13. Alteration of Agreement

This Agreement is entire and contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties. No alteration or variation shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties hereto, or as permitted by the terms of this Agreement, and no oral understanding or agreement shall be binding on the parties hereto.

14. Notice

- A. Any notice, request, demand or other communication required or permitted hereunder shall be deemed to be properly given when deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed:

PROJECT SERVICES

Pursuant to the Agreement for Services between The San Mateo County Children & Families First Commission and San Mateo County Health Services Agency, Division of Public Health (WIC Program) entered onto on July 01, 2001, Contractor shall provide the following services as described in Attachment A, attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, over the term of this contract from July 01, 2001 to June 30, 2004.

Attachment A reflects the scope of work for the first year of the contract, July 01, 2001 to June 30, 2002. It is understood and agreed that Contractor will submit an updated scope of work for each succeeding year by June 01, 2002 and 2003, respectively and receive written approval from the Executive Director, after consultation with the Chair of the Commission, prior to commencing the second and third year provided, however, that there shall be no change in the maximum amount payable under this Agreement. It is anticipated that the scope of work will be amended, with written approval of the Executive Director, upon review of the Contractor's prior year's progress reports.

Contractor will use service delivery improvement and systems change strategies to:

- Increase the number of pregnant women who initiate and sustain breastfeeding through education that consists
 of:
 - a) Conducting breastfeeding classes in Spanish and English to 3.000 WIC clients and 1,500 non-WIC clients
 - b) Purchasing and providing incentive items for class attendees
 - c) Conducting outreach (distribute flyers, attend health fairs, place ads, reminder calls) about breastfeeding classes.
- 2. Increase the number of pregnant women who initiate and sustain breastfeeding by providing Breastfeeding Care Center (BCC) support services that consist of:
 - a) Establishing and staffing a toll-free breastfeeding help line
 - b) Purchasing and providing incentive items for nursing mothers
 - c) Making phone calls to all pregnant WIC clients within 2 weeks prior to their due date.
- 3. Increase the number of pregnant women who initiate and sustain breastfeeding through community outreach activities that consist of:
 - a) Providing breastfeeding in-service training for health care providers
 - b) Conducting breastfeeding outreach activities (ads on SamTrans lines and in media)
 - c) Participating in community fairs.
- 4. Increase the number of pregnant women who initiate and sustain breastfeeding through loans of electric breast pumps to working or full-time student mothers who are exclusively breastfeeding.
 - a) Providing breast pumps to moms
 - b) Educating mothers on how to maintain milk supply while separated from baby.

EXHIBIT B

PAYMENTS

Pursuant to the Agreement for Services between The San Mateo County Children & Families First Commission and San Mateo County Health Services Agency, Division of Public Health (WIC Program) entered onto on July 01, 2001, the Commission shall pay, as described in Attachment B, attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, to the San Mateo County Public Health Division (WIC Program) for services rendered, over the term of this contract from July 01, 2001 to June 30, 2004.

Attachment B reflects the budget for the first year of the contract, July 01, 2001 to June 30, 2002. It is understood and agreed that Contractor will submit an updated budget for each succeeding year by June 01, 2002 and 2003, respectively and receive written approval from the Executive Director, after consultation with the Chair of the Commission, prior to commencing the second and third year provided, however, that there shall be no change in the maximum amount payable under this Agreement. It is anticipated that the budget will be amended, with written approval of the Executive Director, upon review of the prior year's progress reports. It is also understood that contractor may earn money from funds received under this contract. Any monies earned from investments or otherwise shall be expended on services provided under this contract. Provision for expenditure of this money shall be included in the budgets for years two and three.

- 1. The Commission shall pay Contractor based on a 50/40/10 formula whereby 50% of the Maximum Amount of the annual award shall be released to the Contractor upon approval and execution of the contract. After a review of the Contractor's Semi-Annual Progress Report, 40% of the Maximum Amount of the annual award shall be released. The remaining 10% shall be released after a review of the Contractor's Annual Progress Report (see schedule below).
 - Guidelines for the progress reports will be provided by the Commission staff and shall include a descriptive narrative, tracking of the approved timeline and work plan (scope of work), and a detailed financial accounting of all grant funds spent in comparison with the approved budget.
- 2. Payment shall be conditioned on the performance of the services described in Exhibit A to the full satisfaction of the Executive Director, on behalf of the Children & Families First Commission.
- 3. The amount that the Commission shall be obligated to pay for services rendered under this Agreement shall not exceed \$738,120 for the contract term, July 01, 2001 to June 30, 2004.
- 4. Payment is contingent upon satisfactory performance, appropriate grant management, and timely reporting.
- 5. Contractor shall expend funds received, in accordance with the budget as described in Attachment B, attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, or as approved later by the Executive Director, on behalf of the Commission.
