AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO AND THE COUNTY OF SAN MATEO FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF FY 2008 UASI REGIONAL FUNDS

SECOND AMENDMENT

THIS AMENDMENT (this "Amendment") is made as of **March 30, 2010**, in San Francisco, California, by and between the **COUNTY OF SAN MATEO** ("SAN MATEO"), and the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation ("City"), in its capacity as fiscal agent for the UASI Approval Authority, acting by and through the San Francisco Department of Emergency Management.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, City and SAN MATEO have entered into the Agreement (as defined below); and

WHEREAS, City and SAN MATEO desire to modify the Agreement on the terms and conditions set forth herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, SAN MATEO and the City agree as follows:

- **1. Definitions.** The following definitions shall apply to this Amendment:
- **a. Agreement**. The term "Agreement" shall mean the "Agreement between the City and County of San Francisco and the County of San Mateo for the Distribution of FY 2008 UASI Regional Funds" dated **October 23, 2008** between SAN MATEO and City, as amended by the:
 - First Amendment, dated September 22, 2009.
- **b. Other Terms.** Terms used and not defined in this Amendment shall have the meanings assigned to such terms in the Agreement.
- **2. Modifications to the Agreement.** The Agreement is hereby modified as follows:
 - **a. Section 3.1, Duration of Term**. Section 3.1 currently reads as follows:

The term of this Agreement shall commence on <u>OCTOBER 23, 2008</u> and shall end at 11:59 p.m. San Francisco time on <u>NOVEMBER 30, 2010</u>.

Such section is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

The term of this Agreement shall commence on <u>OCTOBER 23, 2008</u> and shall end at 11:59 p.m. San Francisco time on <u>JANUARY 31, 2011</u>.

b. Section 3.2, Maximum Amount of Funds. Section 3.2 currently reads as follows:

In no event shall the amount of Grant Funds disbursed hereunder exceed **ONE MILLION, ONE HUNDRED EIGHTY EIGHT THOUSAND, SIX HUNDRED TWENTY NINE DOLLARS** (\$1,188,629).

Such section is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

In no event shall the amount of Grant Funds disbursed hereunder exceed ONE MILLION, SEVEN HUNDRED FORTY THOUSAND, THREE HUNDRED TWENTY NINE DOLLARS (\$1,740,329).

c. Appendix A, Authorized Expenditures and Timelines. Appendix A identifies the authorized purposes, deliverables, deadlines and "not to exceed" ("NTE") amounts for projects funded by the Grant Funds distributed under this Agreement.

Such Appendix is hereby amended to reflect the following:

- i) Increase of funds in Project A, Interoperable Communications, for equipment in the amount of \$500,000.
- ii) Added funds for training in Project B, Regional Exercise, in the amount of \$11,500 for the Golden Guardian exercise as directed by policy.
- iii) Increase of funds in Project C, Training, for Conference Attendance and Training related to the Information Sharing Project.
- iv) Increase of funds in Project G, Regional Collaboration, for the enhancement, sustainment and maintenance of the Early Warning and Notification System in the amount of \$39,000.

A revised Appendix A is attached to this Second Amendment and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein. The attached Appendix A supersedes all prior versions of Appendix A.

- **d.** Appendix B, Grant Assurances. Appendix B contains the applicable grant assurances. Appendix B is not amended but SAN MATEO is re-signing Appendix B in executing this Second Amendment, to certify its current compliance with all applicable grant assurances. The attached Appendix B is incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.
- **3. Effective Date.** Each of the modifications set forth in Section 2 shall be effective on and after the date of this Amendment.
- **4. Legal Effect.** Except as expressly modified by this Amendment, all of the terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain unchanged and in full force and effect.

- 1. - 21. Will ensure that the facilities under its ownership, lease or supervision which shall be utilized in the accomplishment of this project are not listed in the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) list of Violating Facilities, and will notify OHS and the Federal Grantor agency of the receipt of any communication from the Director of the EPA Office of Federal

Activities indicating that a facility to be used in the project is under consideration for listing by the EPA.

- 22. Will provide any information requested by FEMA/OHS to insure compliance with applicable laws including the following:

 - b. Title 44 C.F.R. Parts 9 and 10, referencing floodplain management and environmental considerations.
 - c. Notification of violating facilities pursuant to E.O. 11738.
 - d. Assurance of project consistency with the approved state management program developed under the Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C. §§ 1451 et seg.).
 - e. Conformity of federal actions to State (Clean Air) Implementation Plans under Section 176(c) of the Clean Air Act of 1955, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 7401 et seq.).
 - f. Protection of underground sources of drinking water under the Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974, as amended, (P.L. 93-523).
 - g. California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), California Public Resources Code §§ 21080-21098, and Title 14 C.C.R. Chapter 3 §§ 15000-15007.
 - h. Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1968 (16 U.S.C. §§ 1271 et.seq.) related to protecting components or potential components of the national wild and scenic rivers system.
 - i. Applicable provisions of the Coastal Barrier Resources Act (P.L. 97-348) dated October 19, 1982 (16 U.S.C. 3501 et seq.) which prohibits the expenditure of most new Federal funds within the units of the Coastal Barrier Resources System.
 - j. Will comply with all conditions placed on any project as the result of the EHP review; any change to the scope of work of a project will require re-evaluation of compliance with these EHP requirements.
 - k. Agrees not to undertake any project having the potential to impact the EHP resources without the prior written approval of FEMA/OHS, including but not limited to communications towers, physical security enhancements, new construction and modifications to buildings that are 50 (fifty) years old or more.
- 23. Will comply with Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS) requirements as stated in the California Emergency Services Act, Government Code, Chapter 7 of Division 1 of Title 2, § 8607.1(e) and Title 19 C.C.R. §§ 2445, 2446, 2447 and 2448.
- 24. Agrees that all publications created or published with funding under this grant shall prominently contain the following statement: "This document was prepared under a grant from FEMA's Grant Programs Directorate, U.S. Department of Homeland Security. points of view or opinions expressed in this document are those of the authors and do not necessarily represent the official position or policies of FEMA's Grant Programs Directorate or the U.S. Department of Homeland Security." The recipient also agrees that, when practicable, any equipment purchased with grant funding shall be prominently marked as follows: "Purchased with funds provided by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security."
- 25. Has requested through the State of California, federal financial assistance to be used to perform eligible work approved in the submitted application for federal assistance and after

the receipt of federal financial assistance, through the State of California, agree to the following:

- a. Promptly return to the State of California all the funds received which exceed the approved, actual expenditures as accepted by the federal or state government.
- b. In the event the approved amount of the grant is reduced, the reimbursement applicable to the amount of the reduction will be promptly refunded to the State of California.
- c. Separately account for interest earned on grant funds, and will return all interest earned, in excess of \$100 per federal fiscal year.
- 26. Will comply with the Intergovernmental Personnel Act of 1970 (42 U.S.C. §§ 4728-4763) relating to prescribed standards for merit systems for programs funded under one of the nineteen statutes or regulations specified in Appendix A of OPM's Standards for a Merit System of Personnel Administration (5 C.F.R. 900, Subpart F).
- 27. Will comply with provisions of the Hatch Act (5 U.S.C. §§ 1501-1508 and 7324-7328), which limit the political activities of employees whose principal employment activities are funded in whole or in part with federal funds.
- 28. Will comply, if applicable, with P.L. 93-348 regarding the protection of human subjects involved in research, development, and related activities supported by this award of assistance.
- 29. Will comply, if applicable, with the Laboratory Animal Welfare Act of 1966 (P. L. 89-544, as amended, 7 U.S.C. § 2131 et seq.) pertaining to the care, handling, and treatment of warm blooded animals held for research, teaching, or other activities supported by this award of assistance.
- 30. Will comply with the minimum wage and maximum hour provisions of the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act (29 U.S.C. § 201), as they apply to employees of institutions of higher education, hospitals, and other non-profit organizations.
- 31. Will comply, as applicable, with the provisions of the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. §§ 276a to 276a-7), the Copeland Act (40 U.S.C. § 276c and 18 U.S.C. § 874), and the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. §§ 327-333), regarding labor standards for federally assisted construction subagreements.

32. Agrees that:

- a. No federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of SAN MATEO, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the making of any federal grant, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any federal grant or cooperative agreement.
- b. If any other funds than federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or an employee of Congress, or employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the federal grant or cooperative agreement, SAN MATEO shall complete and submit Standard Form LLL, "Disclosure of Lobbying Activities," in accordance with its instructions.

- c. SAN MATEO shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers including subgrants, contracts under grants and cooperative agreements, and subcontract(s) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.
- d. This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by 31 U.S.C. §1352. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.
- 33. Agrees that equipment acquired or obtained with grant funds:
 - a. Will be made available pursuant to applicable terms of the California Disaster and Civil Defense Master Mutual Aid Agreement in consultation with representatives of the various fire, emergency medical, hazardous materials response services, and law enforcement agencies within the jurisdiction of the applicant, and deployed with personnel trained in the use of such equipment in a manner consistent with the California Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Plan or the California Fire Services and Rescue Mutual Aid Plan.
 - b. Is consistent with needs as identified in the State Homeland Security Strategy and will be deployed in conformance with that Strategy.
- 34. Agrees that funds awarded under this grant will be used to supplement existing funds for program activities, and will not supplant (replace) non-federal funds.
- 35. Will comply with all applicable Federal statutes, regulations, policies, guidelines and requirements, including OMB Circulars A-21, A-87, A102, A-110, A-122, and A-133, E.O. 12372 and the current Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements. Will also comply with Title 28 C.F.R. Parts 66 and 70, that govern the application, acceptance and use of Federal funds for federally assisted projects.
- 36. Will comply with provisions of 28 C.F.R. applicable to grants and cooperative agreements, Including:
 - a. Part 18. Administrative Review Procedures.
 - b. Part 20, Criminal Justice Information Systems.
 - c. Part 22, Confidentiality of Identifiable Research and Statistical Information.
 - d. Part 23, Criminal Intelligence Systems Operating Policies.
 - e. Part 30, Intergovernmental Review of Department of Justice Programs and Activities.

- 37. Will comply with Subtitle A, Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990.
- 38. Agrees to cooperate with any assessments, national evaluation efforts, or information or data collection requests, including, but not limited to, the provision of any information required for the assessment or evaluation of any activities within this agreement.
- 39. Will maintain procedures to minimize the time elapsing between the award of funds and the disbursement of funds.
- 40. Will comply with the financial and administrative requirements set forth in the current edition of the Office of Justice Programs (OJP) Financial Guide and the current US Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Financial Management Guide.
- 41. Agrees that all allocations and use of funds under this grant will be in accordance with the federal FY 2008 Homeland Security Grant Program Guidance and Application Kit, and the California Supplement to the FY 2008 Homeland Security Grant Program Guidance and Application Kit. All allocations and use of funds under this grant will be in accordance with the Allocations, and use of grant funding must support the goals and objectives included in the State and/or Urban Area Homeland Security Strategies as well as the investments identified in the Investment Justifications which were submitted as part of the California FY2008 Homeland Security Grant Program application. - 44. As required by Executive Order 12549, Debarment and Suspension, and implemented at 28 C.F.R. Part 67, for prospective participants in primary covered transactions, as defined at 28 C.F.R. Part 67 § 67.510.
 - a. SAN MATEO certifies that it and its principals:
 - (i) Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, sentenced to a denial of Federal benefits by a State or Federal court, or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency.

- 45. Agrees to comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988, and implemented at 28 C.F.R. Part
 - 67, Subpart F, for grantees, as defined at 28 C.F.R. Part 67 §§ 67.615 and 67.620 and certifies that it will or will continue to provide a drug-free workplace by:
 - (a) Publishing a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in SAN MATEO's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition.
