WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code, Section 31000, County may contract with independent contractors for the furnishing of such services to or for County or any Department thereof;

WHEREAS, the parties entered into Agreement 68151 for an Adult Day Care Program, an Alzheimer's Program, a Congregate Nutrition Program, the Meals on Wheels and Supplemental Meals on Wheels Programs, and a Transportation Program on July 18, 2006;

WHEREAS, the parties wish to amend the Agreement increasing funding for the Adult Day Care Program, Congregate Nutrition Program, the Meals on Wheels and Supplemental Meals on Wheels Programs, and a new Family Caregiver Support Program by \$39,224 for a total of \$526,661; and

WHEREAS, the parties wish to further amend the Agreement to add Section 23. Grievance Procedures:

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED BY THE PARTIES HERETO AS FOLLOWS:

1. Section 3 of the agreement is amended to read as follows:

3. Payments.

In consideration of the services provided by Contractor in accordance with all terms, conditions and specifications set forth herein and in Schedule A (revised), County shall make payment to Contractor based on the rates and in the manner specified in Schedule B (revised). The County reserves the right to withhold payment if the County determines that the quantity or quality of the work performed is unacceptable. In no event shall the County's total fiscal obligation under this Agreement exceed FIVE HUNDRED TWENTY-SIX THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED SIXTY-ONE DOLLARS (\$526,661).

2. Section 23 is added to the Original Agreement as follows:

23. Grievance Procedures

Consumers of services funded through Aging and Adult Services (AAS) shall have the opportunity to file a written complaint against an AAS-funded program or an employee or volunteer of that program. All service providers must have a written grievance/complaint process for reviewing and attempting to resolve consumer complaints. Should the complaint not result in resolution at the provider level, the consumer or his/her representative may bring the complaint to AAS. The levels of resolution are as follows:

First Level:

The service provider (AAS subcontractor)

Second Level:

The Health Services Manager over the Commissions and

Provider Services Unit

Third Level:

The AAS Director

SCHEDULE A AMENDMENT ONE

PENINSULA VOLUNTEERS, INC.

FY 2006-2007 DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

Contractor shall operate the following Older Americans Act (OAA) and/or Community-Based Services (CBSP) program(s): an Adult Day Care Program, an Alzheimer's Program, a Congregate Nutrition Program, the Meals on Wheels and Supplemental Meals on Wheels Programs, and a Transportation Program. Services described in this Schedule A reflect program performance requirements (units of service) during fiscal year July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007. These programs shall operate in accordance with the California Department of Aging and/or state licensing regulations and the standards and requirements established by Aging and Adult Services of San Mateo County. A monitoring will be conducted annually and onsite, in accordance with the Area Agency on Aging Contract Monitoring Procedures Manual. Contractor agrees to provide requested programmatic and administrative documentation as part of the contract monitoring process.

I. ADULT DAY CARE PROGRAM

A. Units of Service

Contractor agrees to provide 136 unduplicated clients with 8,850 days of attendance.

B. Unit Definitions

Adult Day Care: To provide a day of attendance for an eligible client at a facility or center.

Unit of Service: One day (four-hour minimum)

C. <u>Program Requirements</u>

Contractor agrees to:

- 1. Be licensed by the State of California and conform to State regulations;
- 2. Make arrangements for transporting clients to and from the site through the use of an agency owned and operated vehicle or by arrangement with another agency or through other means;
- 3. Offer a daily nutrition program; and
- 4. Prepare an individual assessment with a care plan for clients and offer appropriate therapeutic programs based on licensing guidelines

and social activities as well as other supportive services for clients and their caregivers.

II. ALZHEIMER'S PROGRAM

A. Units of Service

Contractor agrees to provide 32 unduplicated clients with the following services: four community education sessions, 2,727 days of attendance, 395 hours of family counseling and training, 20 in-service staff training sessions, nine professional service provider sessions, and 32 support group sessions.

B. Unit Definitions

Community Education: Presentations will be conducted alone or jointly with other community providers to provide needed information to professionals and service providers in the community.

Unit of Service: One session

Day of Attendance: To provide an environment designed to accommodate participants experiencing moderate to severe stages of Alzheimer's Disease. Program to include dementia specific services and a noon meal.

Unit of Service: One day (five-hour minimum)

Family Counseling/Training: Trained social workers or other professionals on staff to provide counseling to assist families by referring them to specific resources in the area to address dementia-related issues in depth.

Unit of Service: One hour

In-Service Staff Training: Conduct training sessions for staff and volunteers that emphasize understanding dementia.

Units of Service: One session

Professional Service Provider Sessions: Use student intern programs to provide training for professional service providers in the community. Units of service: One session

Support Group Sessions: Sessions conducted for caregivers through caregiver support groups and other caregiver activities no fewer than nine times per year by staff associated with the ADCRC or by arrangement with other support group providers in the local community.

Unit of Service: One session

C. Program Requirements

Peninsula Volunteers - Schedule A (revised)

Contractor agrees to:

- Provide services to meet the special care needs of participants with dementia, concentrating on participants in the moderate to severe ranges of disability due to dementia. Provide respite relief, counseling and referral to other services for families and caregivers. The ADCRC must conduct dementia appropriate, specifically designed activities related to social, cognitive and physical functioning as well as activities of daily living that maintain the dignity of each individual and use available skills and knowledge;
- 2. Provide physical facilities that include safeguards to protect the participants' safety. The ADCRC must have a written plan for emergency preparedness including evacuation in the event of fire, earthquake, or other potentially life threatening disaster;
- 3. Develop an individual written plan of care for each participant based upon functional capacity and services needed and available within the context of the day care program and its resources. Care planning should include multidisciplinary input;
- 4. Provide or arrange for a nutritious noon meal for participants that provides one-third of the Recommended Dietary Allowance for older persons. Morning and afternoon snacks should also be available;
- 5. Provide directly or arrange for transportation so that clients can get to the ADCRC site. If the site provides transportation directly, all laws and regulations pertaining to vehicle maintenance, the qualification of drivers, and insurance shall be followed to assure safety; and
- 6. Conduct community outreach activities and provide Alzheimer's Disease educational and informational materials to the community.

III. CONGREGATE NUTRITION PROGRAM

A. Units of Service

Contractor agrees to provide 136 unduplicated clients with 8,850 congregate meals, and four nutrition education presentations.

B. Unit Definitions

Meal: To provide one meal which assures a minimum of one-third of the current Recommended Dietary Allowance for adults.

Unit of Service: One meal

Nutrition Education: To provide regularly scheduled programs on nutrition, diet and health promotion issues. Programs and materials are to be approved by a qualified dietician or nutritionist. Methods of education may include demonstrations, audio-visual presentations or small group discussions for congregate program participants. Handout materials may be used as the sole education component for home-delivered meal program participants.

Unit of Service: One presentation

C. Program Requirements

Contractor agrees to:

- Conform to the appropriate federal, state and local requirements, especially the standards and practices identified in California Code of Regulations, Title 22, California Department of Aging Title III Program Manual and current California Uniform Retail Food Facilities Law (CURFFL) regarding safe and sanitary preparation and service of meals; and
- 2. Operate the program five days a week (or as negotiated for less or alternative service).

IV. FAMILY CAREGIVER SUPPORT PROGRAM (ONE-TIME-ONLY)

A. Units of Service

Contractor agrees to provide training to caregivers including home visits by an occupational and physical therapist (Rehab Team), specialized equipment, Sit and Be Fit videos or DVDs (100), an open house and support groups with the Rehab Team, and outreach and resource materials for caregivers.

B. <u>Unit Definitions</u>

Home Visits by Occupational Therapist: To provide 10 home visits to train caregivers in self-care methods and caregiver health, to teach them methods to make transfers within the home setting more safely, and to aid care-recipients to do ADL's more efficiently with the use of adaptive equipment at mealtimes.

Unit of Service: One visit

Home Visits by Physical Therapist: To provide 10 home visits by a Physical Therapist to set up home exercise programs that will benefit both the caregivers and the care-recipients.

Unit of Service: One visit

Caregiver Support Groups: To provide an educational series for caregivers at four caregiver support group meetings, once a month to instruct and train caregivers in transferring with the correct use of safe body mechanics and techniques, use of adaptive equipment, signs of dysphagia (swallowing disorders), and communications and other speech-related issues. Consultations and home visits will be offered as follow-up.

Unit of Service: One session

Open House: To provide one educational panel to the community at large by Rehab Team, with introduction of Rosener House Director, Social Worker Program Coordinator, and Dementia Services Coordinator to familiarize attendees with Rosener House Program.

Unit of Service: One visit

Outreach: To provide outreach flyers regarding Rosener House services to aging services providers and advertisement for Open House in the local paper.

Unit of Service: NA

Resource Library Books: To develop a resource library for caregivers at Rosener House that may be utilized by San Mateo County residents and that will loan out or give away caregiver resources.

Unit of Service: NA

Resource Library Videos: To provide videos for caregivers to borrow, including videos in Spanish and Mandarin.

Unit of Service: NA

C. Program Requirements

Contractor agrees to:

- 1. Provide this service in accordance with the guidelines set forth in the Aging and Adult Services Request for Proposals, the Title IIIE Older Americans Act guidelines, and any other applicable rules and regulations as adopted by San Mateo County Aging and Adult Services;
- 2. **Program Requirements** means requirements found in the Older Americans Act (OAA), Title III, Part E, Sections 371 through 374;
- 3. Eligible Service Population for Title III E means:
 - a. A Family Caregiver
 - b. A Grandparent or Older Individual Who is a Relative Caregiver;

Peninsula Volunteers - Schedule A (revised)

4. **A Family Caregiver** is defined in Title III, Part E, Sections 372(2) of the OAA as an adult family member or another individual who is an informal provider of in-home and community care to an older individual. "Family caregiver" is used interchangeably with "informal caregiver". "Informal" means that the care is not provided as part of a public or private formal service program;

A Family Caregiver provides care without pay. FCSP funds cannot be used to pay the Family Caregiver a stipend or salary for providing care. FCSP funds may be used to pay another family member or friend to provide respite care or supplemental services to the Family Caregiver;

- 5. A Grandparent or Older Individual Who is a Relative Caregiver is defined as a grandparent or step-grandparent of a child, or a relative of a child by blood or marriage, who is 60 years of age or older, and who meets the following additional criteria in Title III, Part E, Section 372 (3) of the OAA:
 - a. Lives with a child;
 - b. Is the primary caregiver of the child because the biological or adoptive parents are unable or unwilling to serve as the primary caregiver of the child; and
 - c. Has legal relationship with child, as such legal custody or guardianship, or is raising the child informally;
- 6. An Older Individual Receiving Care (Care Receiver) is defined as one who is 60 years of age or older [Title III, Part E, Section 373(2); Part A, Section 102(35)]. Family Caregivers cannot receive FCSP-funded respite and supplemental services specified in paragraph 7 of this section unless the Care Receiver meets the more restrictive eligibility criteria specified in Title III, Part E, Section 373 (c) (1) (B) of the OAA and the definition of "frail" in OAA Section 102 (26), which requires that the Care Receiver is unable to perform at least two activities of daily living (ADLs) [i.e., human assistance is needed for eating, toileting, continence, transferring in/out of bed or chair, bathing, dressing] or requires substantial supervision due to a cognitive or other mental impairment;
- 7. A Child (who receives care from a Grandparent or Older Individual who is a Relative Caregiver) is defined in Title III, Part E, Section 372(1) of the OAA as an individual who is not more than 18 years of age; and
- 8. **Title III E (Family Caregiver Support Program)** is defined in Title III, Part E, Section 373(b) as support services that include (1) information to caregivers about available services; (2) assistance to caregivers in gaining access to the services; (3) individual counseling, organization

of support groups, and caregiver training to caregivers to assist the caregivers in making decisions and solving problems relating to their caregiving roles; (4) respite care to enable caregivers to be temporarily relieved from their caregiving responsibilities; and (5) supplemental services, on a limited basis, to complement the care provided by caregivers. In accordance with Title III, Part E, Section 373(e)(1), the Department has established for the five support service categories additional service standards that must be met documented in the FCSP Service Matrix, which the Department publishes periodically, as necessary.

The following apply to the Respite service category above:

- a. "Respite" can be in the form of respite provided in the home (and may include the provision of personal, homemaker, and chore services to the care receiver), respite provided by attendance of the care receiver at day care or other non-residential day center or program (including recreational outings for children), and respite provided by attendance of the care receiver in a facility for an overnight stay on an occasional or emergency basis (such as a nursing hone for older adults or summer camp for grandchildren).
- b. "Temporarily" means a brief period of relief or rest from a caregivers responsibilities during a limited time period.
- c. Title III E funds cannot be used to support the following activities:
 - (1) To pay the costs for a family caregiver to attend a camp, spa, resort, or restaurant;
 - (2) To temporarily relieve workers from formally paid services (e.g., In-Home Supportive Services or services required to be provided in a licensed facility such as a Residential Care Facility for the Elderly); and
 - (3) To supplement the service unit cost of "a participant day" at an adult day care program.

V. MEALS ON WHEELS AND SUPPLEMENTAL MEALS ON WHEELS PROGRAMS

A. <u>Units of Service</u>

Contractor agrees to provide 350 unduplicated senior clients with 50,000 home-delivered meals, 40 unduplicated clients with 6,429 supplemental home-delivered meals, 50 units of nutrition counseling, and four nutrition education presentations.

B. Unit Definitions

Meal: To provide one meal which assures a minimum of one-third of the current Recommended Dietary Allowance for adults.

Unit of Service: One meal

Nutrition Counseling: To provide individual dietary evaluation and counseling performed by a dietitian or nutritionist, which relate to normal or therapeutic nutritional needs. Nutrition counseling may be provided either in person or by telephone.

Unit of Service: One hour

Nutrition Education: To provide regularly scheduled programs on nutrition, diet and health promotion issues. Programs and materials are to be approved by a qualified dietician or nutritionist. Methods of education may include demonstrations, audio-visual presentations or small group discussions for congregate program participants. Handout materials may be used as the sole education component for home-delivered meal program participants.

Unit of Service: One presentation

C. Program Requirements

Contractor agrees to:

- Conform to the appropriate federal, state and local requirements, especially the standards and practices identified in California Code of Regulations, Title 22, California Department of Aging Title III Program Manual, current California Uniform Retail Food Facilities Law (CURFFL) and policies and procedures as set forth in Meals on Wheels Policy (rev 11/96.);
- 2. Operate the program five days of service each week, Monday through Friday. Weekend and extra meal service shall be provided in accordance with Meals on Wheels Policy;
- 3. Provide nutrition counseling for clients of Meals on Wheels and Supplemental Meals on Wheels who require the service, who are referred by physician's order for special diets, and who are determined by the Nutritional Screening Initiative to be at risk; and
- 4. Participate in Meals on Wheels Coalition meetings.

VI. TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM

A. Units of Service

Contractor agrees to provide 136 unduplicated clients with 17,700 trips.

B. Unit Definition

Transportation: To take a client from one location (home, senior center

facility, etc.) to another.

Unit of Service: One one-way trip

C. Program Requirements

Contractor agrees to:

- Coordinate services with all other relevant transit, especially paratransit services available from Redi-Wheels and Redi-Coast;
- 2. Bill additional transportation services to the contract only if the client is allowed to pay a suggested contribution and will not be denied services if he/she is unable to pay; and
- 3. Provide transportation for clients of senior centers or adult day programs as the established priority. Agencies should provide additional shopping assistance or medial trip services only if there is a defined need and only if resources permit.

FY 2006-2007 FISCAL SUMMARY

Contractor shall operate the following Older Americans Act (OAA) and/or Community-Based Services (CBSP) program(s): an Adult Day Care Program, an Alzheimer's Program, a Congregate Nutrition Program, the Meals on Wheels and Supplemental Meals on Wheels Programs, and a Transportation Program. Services described in this Schedule B reflect program funding and payment methods during fiscal year July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007. These programs shall operate in accordance with the California Department of Aging and/or state licensing regulations, applicable federal laws, and the standards and requirements established by Aging and Adult Services of San Mateo County.

ADULT DAY CARE PROGRAM

Aging and Adult Services will pay the contractor in consideration of Adult Day Care Program services rendered through OAA funds, the rate of \$4.30 per day.

AAS will pay the contractor a total of \$2,215 for equipment and supplies for the Adult Day Care Program.

The maximum reimbursement for the Adult Day Care Program during the contract term July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007 shall not exceed FORTY THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY DOLLARS (\$40,270).

II. ALZHEIMER'S PROGRAM

Aging and Adult Services will pay the contractor in consideration of Alzheimer's Program services rendered through IIIB OAA funds, the rate of one-twelfth of the total reimbursement for this program per month, as long as this amount does not exceed the total cost of Alzheimer's services rendered.

The maximum reimbursement for the Alzheimer's Program during the contract term July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007 shall not exceed SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$60,000).

III. CONGREGATE NUTRITION PROGRAM

Aging and Adult Services will pay the contractor in consideration of Congregate Nutrition Program services rendered through combined OAA and Nutrition Services Incentive Program (NSIP) funds, the rate of \$3.70 per meal.

AAS will pay the contractor a total of \$700 for equipment and supplies for the Congregate Nutrition Program.

Peninsula Volunteers - Schedule B (revised)

The maximum reimbursement for the Congregate Nutrition Program during the contract term July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007 shall not exceed THIRTY-THREE THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED FORTY-FIVE DOLLARS (\$33,445).

IV. FAMILY CAREGIVER SUPPORT PROGRAM (ONE-TIME-ONLY)

Aging and Adult Services will pay the contractor in consideration of Family Caregiver Support Program services rendered through OAA funds in two installments, as invoiced, as long as this amount does not exceed the cost of Family Caregiver Support Program services rendered.

The maximum reimbursement for the Family Caregiver Support Program during the contract term July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007 shall not exceed FOURTEEN THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED FIFTY-NINE DOLLARS (\$14,259).

V. MEALS ON WHEELS AND SUPPLEMENTAL MEALS ON WHEELS PROGRAMS

Aging and Adult Services will pay the contractor in consideration of Meals on Wheels Program services rendered through combined OAA and NSIP funds, the rate of \$5.00 per home-delivered meal, and in consideration of Supplemental Meals on Wheels Program services rendered through the Meals on Wheels Trust, the rate of \$6.00 per supplemental home-delivered meal.

AAS will pay the contractor a total of \$22,050 for equipment and supplies for the Meals on Wheels Program.

The maximum reimbursement for the Meals on Wheels Program during the contract term July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007 shall not exceed TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY-TWO THOUSAND FIFTY DOLLARS (\$272,050).

The maximum reimbursement for the Supplemental Meals on Wheels Program during the contract term July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007 shall not exceed THIRTY-EIGHT THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED SEVENTY-FOUR DOLLARS (\$38,574).

VI. TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM

Aging and Adult Services will pay contractor in consideration of Transportation Program services rendered through IIIB OAA funds, the rate of one-twelfth of the total reimbursement of this program per month, as long as this amount does not exceed the total cost of transportation services rendered.

The maximum reimbursement for the Transportation Program during the contract term July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007 shall not exceed THIRTY-FIVE THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$35,400).

Contractor agrees to the following:

- A. Contractor is responsible for covering the cost of all components of each program outlined above and shall be reimbursed for actual expenditures on the approved budget for each program;
- B. A mid-year review, scheduled for January, will require a reconciliation of year-to-date outcomes. Based on these outcomes, a budget revision may be required;
- C. Submit client intake forms as appropriate, monthly program reports and invoices by the tenth (10th) of each month. (Invoices submitted more than two months past the month of service may not be reimbursed. Statistical reports submitted more than one month past the month of service may result in withholding of payments until reports are brought current.);
- D. Offer services throughout the twelve-month contract period, unless prior written approval is received from Aging and Adult Services;
- E. Submit a closing report by July 31, 2007;
- F. Program Income must be reported and expended under the same terms and conditions as the program funds from which it is generated; and
- G. Program Income must be used to pay for current allowable costs of the program in the same fiscal year that the income was earned.

The maximum reimbursement for contracted services between San Mateo County Aging and Adult Services and Peninsula Volunteers, Inc., is \$493,998 in OAA, NSIP and Meals on Wheels Trust funds, and \$32,663 in County General Funds for general program support for a total amount of FIVE HUNDRED TWENTY-SIX THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED SIXTY-ONE DOLLARS (\$526,661) for the contract term July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007.
