SUBJECT: Agreement with Tamar Meidav, M.D.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a Resolution:

- 1) Authorizing the President of the Board to execute an Agreement with Tamar Meidav, M.D. for the provision of psychiatry services for the term July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2011, for a maximum obligation of \$192,920; and
- 2) Authorizing the Chief of the Health System or designee to execute contract amendments which modify the County's maximum fiscal obligation by no more than \$25,000 (in aggregate), and/or modify the contract term and/or services so long as the modified term or services is/are within the current or revised fiscal provisions.

BACKGROUND:

There has been a shortage of child psychiatrists in California and in the nation for the past several years. Behavioral Health and Recovery Services (BHRS) has found it difficult to fill child psychiatrist positions in San Mateo County due to the high cost of living. Under Administrative Memorandum B-1, agreements with physicians are exempt from the requirement for a Request for Proposals process. BHRS runs advertisements for specialty psychiatric services on a regular basis in the Northern California Psychiatric Newsletter and other venues as needed. Dr. Meidav was selected from candidates who responded to those advertisements in 2003 and has contracted with BHRS since that time.

DISCUSSION:

Dr. Meidav will provide psychiatry services for children and youth at various mental health clinics for a two-year term. The services shall include child and youth medication evaluation and treatment, psychotherapy and family consultation, residency training, case consultation to staff, and other related duties as assigned.

The Agreement has been reviewed and approved by County Counsel and Risk



Management. The contractor has assured compliance with the County's Contractor Employee Jury Service Ordinance, as well as all other contract provisions that are required by County ordinance and administrative memoranda, including but not limited to insurance, hold harmless, non-discrimination and equal benefits. This Agreement is on the Continuing Resolution.

Approval of this Agreement contributes to the Shared Vision 2025 outcome of a Healthy Community through the provision of psychiatry services to children and youth clients of BHRS. The data for the current estimated level of satisfaction has been collected from clients of all ages who are receiving services in a wide range of settings, including those who are in locked placements, and for whom placement is involuntary. The projected 90% satisfaction for FY 2009-10 is the County standard satisfaction target for all services.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The term of the Agreement is July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2011. The Agreement maximum is \$192,920 for the two-year term. For FY 2009-10 the budgeted maximum is \$95,033, which has been included in the BHRS tentatively Adopted FY 2009-10 Budget. Of that amount, Medi-Cal Federal Financial Participation revenue will fund \$42,765, the State General Funds will cover \$25,659, the Human Services Agency will fund \$8,553, Healthy Families and Healthy Kids will fund \$950, and sales tax through realignment will fund \$17,106. There is no Net County Cost. Similar arrangements will be made for FY 2010-11.

Subsequent to the final adoption of the State budget it may be necessary to make changes to this contract in order to reflect legislative action. This contract is recommended to your Board at this time in order to provide a continuity of services to the community until final funding levels can be determined. The contract provides that the County may reduce the scope of the contract to reflect any shortfall in funding from State or federal budget allocations.
