**SUBJECT:** Metropolitan Transportation Commission Grant Funding for the Crystal Springs Regional Trail Project

## **RECOMMENDATION:**

Adopt a Resolution making required findings and authorizing the Director of Public Works, or his designee to:

- 1. Submit a claim to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission and accept Transportation Development Act Article 3 funding in the amount of \$194,549 for the Crystal Springs Regional Trail South of Highway 92 Project; and
- 2. Execute all necessary applications or other documents associated with submission of the claim and acceptance of funding from the Metropolitan Transportation Commission in the amount of \$194,549.

# **BACKGROUND:**

The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) is the regional transportation planning agency for the San Francisco Bay region and is responsible for the distribution of Transportation Development Act (TDA), Article 3 funding. MTC's Resolution No. 875, Revised, entitled "Transportation Development Act, Article 3, Pedestrian/Bicycle Projects", delineates procedures and criteria for submission of requests for TDA Article 3 funding. Furthermore Resolution No. 875, Revised requires that requests for the allocation of TDA Article 3 funding be submitted as part of a single, countywide coordinated claim from each county in the San Francisco Bay region.

The Department of Public Works submitted an application to the TDA Article 3 Program in the amount of \$194,549 for the Crystal Springs Regional Trail South of Highway 92 Project (Project). The application was approved for funding and a formal presentation regarding the project was made to the City/County Association of Governments Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee.

## **DISCUSSION:**

With over 300,000 visitors annually, the Crystal Springs Regional Trail is one of the most popular non-motorized, multiple-use trails in the Bay Area. This Project will help complete an uninterrupted non-motorized trail from the City of San Bruno to the City of Woodside for pedestrians, equestrians, roller skaters, and cyclists. The Project, which begins 950 feet south of the Highway 92 and Skyline Boulevard intersection and ends 5,025 feet south of that intersection at Canada Road across from the Ralston Bicycle Trail, will convert an existing 0.9 mile San Francisco Peninsula Watershed service road into a 10-foot wide paved and 3-foot wide gravel multiple-use trail along the Crystal Springs Reservoir.

Safety is a high priority goal of the Project and provides cyclists and pedestrians an opportunity to recreate and commute on a Class I bikeway independent of automobiles. The 10-foot-wide paved trail accommodates cyclists, in-line skaters, and mobility devices such as wheelchairs and people pushing strollers. The 3-foot-wide gravel shoulder separates use and provides a more desirable surface for runners and equestrians. Four benches, informational and entry signs, kiosks, four trash receptacles and a restroom will be added to support the visitor experience. Construction plans and specifications for the Project are now finalized, and the necessary permits have been obtained.

The Project will also be fully accessible for persons with disabilities as it meets the "Draft Final Accessibility Guidelines for Outdoor Developed Areas" as published in the Federal Register on October 19, 2009.

County Counsel has reviewed and approved the Resolution as to form. The Resolution includes findings, set forth in Attachment A to the Resolution, which are required by Metropolitan Transportation Commission to be adopted by the Board.

Approval of this Resolution contributes to the Shared Vision 2025 outcome of an Environmentally Conscious Community as construction of a new Crystal Springs Regional Trail section increases the number and quality of natural experiences for County Park visitors. Each park visitor that recreates in this natural area will observe and learn about natural habitats and their inhabitants and gain a greater appreciation of the need for their preservation.

## FISCAL IMPACT:

The request for MTC TDA Article 3 grant funds is the first step in securing full funding for the project's estimated cost of \$1,081,827. The Department is currently working with various regional, state and federal agencies for the remaining funds. Consequently, the work will only begin after full project funding has been secured. There is no impact to the General Fund.

SUBMIT A CLAIM TO THE METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION AND ACCEPT TRANSPORTATION DEVELOPMENT ACT ARTICLE 3 FUNDING IN THE AMOUNT OF \$194,549 FOR THE CRYSTAL SPRINGS REGIONAL TRAIL SOUTH OF HIGHWAY 92 PROJECT; AND 2. EXECUTE ALL NECESSARY APPLICATIONS OR OTHER DOCUMENTS ASSOCIATED WITH SUBMISSION OF THE CLAIM AND ACCEPTANCE OF FUNDING FROM THE METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$194,549

WHEREAS, Article 3 of the Transportation Development Act (TDA), Public

Utilities Code (PUC) Section 99200 et seq., authorizes the submission of claims to a

regional transportation planning agency for the funding of projects exclusively for the

benefit and/or use of pedestrians and bicyclists;

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC), as the

regional transportation planning agency for the San Francisco Bay region, has adopted

MTC Resolution No. 875, Revised, entitled "Transportation Development Act, Article 3,

Pedestrian/Bicycle Projects," which delineates procedures and criteria for submission of

requests for the allocation of "TDA Article 3" funding; and

WHEREAS, MTC Resolution No. 875, Revised requires that requests for the

allocation of TDA Article 3 funding be submitted as part of a single, countywide coordinated claim from each county in the San Francisco Bay region; and

WHEREAS, the County of San Mateo desires to submit a claim to MTC for the allocation of TDA Article 3 funds to support the project described in this resolution, which are for the exclusive benefit and/or use of pedestrians and/or bicyclists.

#### NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY DETERMINDED AND ORDERED that the

Director of Public Works shall submit a claim/request for funds in the amount of \$194,549 for the Crystal Springs Regional Trail South of Highway 92 Project to Metropolitan Transportation Commission for an allocation of Transportation Development Act Article 3 Pedestrian and Bicycle Project funding for FY 2011/2012.

#### NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS FURTHER DETERMINED AND ORDERED that the

Board of Supervisors by adoption of this resolution approving the submittal of and acceptance of a claim in the amount of \$194,549 to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission, TDA Article 3 for the Crystal Springs Regional Trail South of Highway 92 Project:

- Declares it is eligible to request an allocation of TDA Article 3 funds pursuant to Section 99234 of the Public Utilities Code, and
- Certifies that there is no pending or threatened litigation that might adversely affect the project described in this resolution, or that might impair the ability of the County of San Mateo to carry out the project; and

- 3. Resolves that a certified copy of this resolution and its attachment and any accompanying supporting materials shall be forwarded to the City/County Association of Governments for submission to MTC as part of the countywide coordinated TDA Article 3 claim.
- 4. Makes the findings attached hereto as Attachment A.

**IT IS FURTHER ORDERED**, that the Director of Public Works, or his designee, is authorized to execute all necessary applications, or other documents associated with submission of the claim and acceptance of funding from the Metropolitan Transportation Commission in the amount of \$194,549.

Re: <u>Request to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission for the Allocation of Fiscal Year</u> 2011-2012 Transportation Development Act Article 3 Pedestrian/Bicycle Project Funding

# Findings

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- That San Mateo County is not legally impeded from submitting a request to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission for the allocation of Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 funds, nor is San Mateo County legally impeded from undertaking the project(s) described in this resolution.
- 2. That San Mateo County has committed adequate staffing resources to complete the project.
- 3. A review of the project has resulted in the consideration of all pertinent matters, including those related to environmental and right-of-way permits and clearances, attendant to the successful completion of the project.
- 4. Issues attendant to securing environmental and right-of-way permits and clearances for the project have been reviewed and will be concluded in a manner and on a schedule that will not jeopardize the deadline for the use of the TDA funds being requested.
- 5. That the project complies with the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA, Public Resources Code Sections 21000 et seq.).
- 6. That as portrayed in the budgetary description of the project, the sources of funding other than TDA are assured and adequate for completion of the project.
- 7. That the project is for capital construction and/or design engineering; and/or for the maintenance of a Class I bikeway which is closed to motorized traffic; and/or for the purposes of restriping Class II bicycle lanes; and/or for the development or support of a bicycle safety education program; and/or for the development of a comprehensive bicycle and/or pedestrian facilities plan, and an allocation of TDA Article 3 funding for such a plan has not been received by San Mateo County within the prior five fiscal years.
- 8. That the project which is a bicycle project has been included in a detailed bicycle circulation element included in an adopted general plan, or included in an adopted comprehensive bikeway plan (such as outlined in Section 2377 of the California Bikeways Act, Streets and Highways Code section 2370 <u>et seq</u>.).
- 9. That the project is a "Class I Bikeway," and meets the mandatory minimum safety design criteria published in Chapter 1000 of the California Highway Design Manual.
- 10. That the project is ready to commence implementation during the fiscal year of the requested allocation.
- 11. That San Mateo County agrees to maintain, or provide for the maintenance of, the project and facilities for the benefit of and use by the public.
